# SUBMISSION PROCEDURES

Prospective authors are invited to submit abstracts describing original work for presentation at the 2013 conference in any technical areas related to digital preservation, image capture and workflow, and digital curation, including those listed to the left. All submitted proposals will be peer reviewed by the program committee to assure that the program provides significant, timely, and authoritative information.

ALL papers presented at IS&T conferences are published in the conference proceedings, indexed with various services, filed with the US Library of Congress, and made available as downloadable PDFs through the IS&T online library. Authors may propose either a 20-minute oral or an interactive discussion presentation format. This enables presenters to engage with other delegates at the conference in the mode best suited to their content and desires. Oral and interactive papers are considered of equal importance and merit.

Papers presented at the conference should be authoritative and complete in regard to advancing the state of knowledge in the area of digital preservation and archiving. The conference language is English. The author's preference for presentation format will be honored as possible.

A web-based form and instructions for submitting an abstract are found at www.imaging.org/conferences/archiving. Use of this process is strongly encouraged, although submissions will be accepted via e-mail at papers@imaging.org. Please put your LAST NAME and ARCH13 SUBMISSION in the subject line.

#### Submissions must include:

- a 500-word abstract that clearly identifies the technical content of the paper. Include information explaining how the material is new or distinct from previously presented or published work on the same topic
- a maximum 50-word biographical sketch of the primary author
- mailing address, phone, fax, and e-mail for the primary author
- names of co-author(s)
- format preference: oral or interactive

## The deadline for abstract submission is November 15, 2012.

Upon notice of acceptance, authors will be sent detailed instructions for submitting the full text of the paper for publication in the conference proceedings, including forms for "transfer of copyright." Please note that each author is responsible for obtaining appropriate clearance as necessary. **Full text papers are due February 4, 2013.**
